**RE: CIA and NYPD Blur Lines between Police Work and Domestic Spying in New York Muslim Areas**

Dear Chairman Feinstein:

We, the undersigned organizations, would like to bring to your attention *The Associated Press* (AP) investigative report, "With CIA help, NYPD moves covertly in Muslim areas," by Adam Goldman.

Following a months-long investigation, AP revealed that the New York City Police Department (NYPD) is using covert surveillance techniques of dubious legality that appear to impede core First Amendment freedoms, which include the right to practice one's faith, the right to freely associate with others, and the right to live without official suspicion directed at one's religious affiliation.

For reasons that will be outlined in this letter, we respectfully request that the U.S. Senate Select Committee on Intelligence launch an immediate investigation into this affair and hold formal hearings on the civil rights implications of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) sponsoring domestic spying activities by the NYPD and the legal questions raised by such activities.

In January 2002, David Cohen, former CIA Deputy Director for Operations, was appointed as New York City's first civilian Deputy Commissioner of Intelligence. Shortly thereafter, Mr. Cohen requested assistance from CIA Director George Tenet, who approved the temporary assignment of Larry Sanchez, a respected CIA veteran, to oversee the establishment of the NYPD's intelligence programs while still on CIA payroll.

Since then, AP reported that, "The [NYPD] has dispatched teams of undercover officers, known as 'rakers,' into minority neighborhoods as part of a human mapping program, according to officials directly involved in the program. They've monitored daily life in bookstores, bars, cafes and nightclubs. Police have also used informants, known as 'mosque crawlers,' to monitor sermons, even when there's no evidence of wrongdoing. NYPD officials have scrutinized imams and gathered intelligence on cab drivers and food cart vendors, jobs often done by Muslims.

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Many of these operations were built with help from the CIA, which is prohibited from spying on Americans but was instrumental in transforming the NYPD's intelligence unit."

While the, "CIA is prohibited from collecting intelligence domestically, the wall between domestic and foreign operations became more porous. Intelligence gathered by the NYPD, with CIA officer Sanchez overseeing collection, was often passed to the CIA in informal conversations and through unofficial channels."

We are also concerned that this federal-state sponsored domestic spying program does not have any formal review or public transparency as, "neither the city council, which finances the department, nor the federal government, which contributes hundreds of millions of dollars each year, is told exactly what's going on."

We believe that these tactics are counter to the Obama administration's new strategy in countering violent extremism (CVE) which explicitly states the focus of surveillance and investigations should be on identified individuals and not entire communities.

We respectfully request that the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence provide the legislative oversight needed to shed light on legally questionable intelligence gathering activities within the United States by the CIA and to assure that such activities are in conformity with the Constitution and laws of the United States.

These revelations send the message to American Muslims that they are a suspect community and that their constitutional rights may be violated with impunity. Once again, we respectfully request that the U.S. Senate Select Committee on Intelligence launch an immediate investigation into this affair and conduct formal hearings on the civil rights implications of the CIA sponsoring domestic spying activities by the NYPD and its legality.

We hope to distribute your response to our constituencies in order to alleviate concerns regarding the CIA blurring of the lines between state police work and federally sponsored domestic spying.
