When and Where to Vote:

- Election Day is Tuesday, November 6, 2012.
- Polls open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.

How to Register to Vote:

- Residents of Clark, Churchill, Elko, Eureka, Humboldt, Lyon, Pershing and Washoe counties are eligible to register to vote online at <https://nvsos.gov/sosvoterservices/Registration/step1.aspx>.
- Other residents can register to vote by completing and printing the voter registration form from <http://www.nvsos.gov/SOSVoterRegForm/VoterForm.aspx>.
- Re-register to vote if you have moved, changed your name, or would like to declare an official party affiliation. If your voter registration information has not changed, you do not need to re-register.
- The deadline for voter registration is October 16, 2012.

What to Bring on Election Day:

- Bring a photo ID with your current address, such as a Nevada driver's license, your state ID, or a US Passport.
- If you do not have a photo ID with a current address, bring two IDs that contain your name and address, such as a utility bill, a bank statement, a paycheck, etc.
- You cannot be turned away from voting because you did not bring proper identification. If you do not have proper ID, you can vote using a provisional ballot.

Absentee Voting:

- Any registered voter is eligible to vote.
- Request an absentee voting application from <http://nvsos.gov/index.aspx?page=77>, and submit it to your local election authority.
- Absentee ballot requests must be received by your local election authority no later than 7:00 p.m. on November 6, 2012.
- Voters are strongly encouraged to go to the polls to vote if possible.

Early Voting:

- Early voting is open to all registered voters. For more information contact your local election authority or visit <http://nvsos.gov/index.aspx?page=1089>.
- Early voting begins on October, 20 until November, 2, 2012.

Your Rights as a Nevada Voter are as Follows:

- To vote in the General Election if you have registered before or on October 16, 2012.
- To have questions concerning voting procedures answered and to receive assistance if needed.
- To vote without being intimidated, threatened, or coerced.

Due to CAIR's 501(c)3 status, CAIR does not endorse any specific candidate or campaign and cannot give advice about how you should vote.

Major newspapers may produce a guide to candidate positions.



- To vote if you are eligible to do so even if you do not bring an ID to the polls.
- To vote using a provisional ballot if your registration comes into question.
- If you feel that your rights are violated or you witness a violation of rights in the registration or voting process, please contact the Nevada Secretary of State’s Elections Division at (775) 684-5705
- Your vote is private – The ballots are processed in such a way that your identity will not be distinguishable from your ballot.
