When and Where to Vote:

- Election Day is Tuesday, November 6, 2012.
- Polls are open from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

How to Register to Vote:

- To register, print the voter registration form from <http://www.elections.ny.gov/VotingRegister.html>, and mail it to your local election authority.
- Re-register to vote if you have moved, changed your name, or would like to declare an official party affiliation. If your voter registration information has not changed, you do not need to re-register.
- Mail in registration forms must be postmarked by October 12, 2012 and received by October 17, 2012.
- In person registration must be made by October 12, 2012.

What to Bring on Election Day:

- Bring a photo ID with your current address, such as a New York driver's license, your state ID, or a US Passport.
- If you do not have a photo ID with a current address, bring two IDs that contain your name and address, such as a utility bill, a bank statement, a paycheck, etc.
- You cannot be turned away from voting because you did not bring proper identification. If you do not have proper ID, you can vote using a provisional ballot.

Absentee Voting:

- Absentee voting is available for registered voters that qualify.
- Request an absentee voting application from <http://www.elections.ny.gov/VotingAbsentee.html>, and mail it to your local election authority.
- Absentee ballots can be requested until October 30, 2012.
- In person absentee voting requests must be made by November 5, 2012.
- Absentee ballots must be postmarked by November 5, 2012 and received by November 13, 2012. Military voter ballots must be received no later than November 19, 2012.
- Voters are strongly encouraged to go to the polls to vote if possible.

Early Voting:

- Early in-person is not available in the state of New York.

Your Rights as a New York Voter are as Follows:

- To vote if you have registered within the correct timeframe.
- To have questions concerning voting procedures answered and to receive assistance if needed.

Due to CAIR's 501(c)3 status, CAIR does not endorse any specific candidate or campaign and cannot give advice about how you should vote.

Major newspapers may produce a guide to candidate positions.



- To vote without being intimidated, threatened, or coerced.
- To vote if you are eligible to do so even if you do not bring an ID to the polls.
- To vote using a provisional ballot if your registration comes into question.
- If you feel that your rights are violated or you witness a violation of rights in the registration or voting process, please contact the New York State Board of Elections at (518) 473-5086
- Your vote is private – The ballots are processed in such a way that your identity will not be distinguishable from your ballot.
